Overview

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Introduction: Today we are beginning our study of Romans which, more than any other book of the New Testament, explains the foundation of our faith.

I. The Significance of Romans

"I greatly longed to understand Paul's Epistle to the Romans, and nothing stood in the way but that one expression, "the righteousness of God" because I took it to mean that righteousness whereby God is righteous and deals righteously in punishing the unrighteous. Night and day I pondered until I grasped the truth that the righteousness of God is that righteousness whereby, through grace and sheer mercy, He justifies us by faith. Thereupon I felt myself to be reborn and to have gone through open doors into paradise. The whole of Scripture took on a new meaning, and whereas before "the righteousness of God" had filled me with hate, now it became to me inexpressibly sweet in greater love. B. The **PROBLEM** of Righteousness (Romans 1:18-3:20)

Romans 3:9-12 "9What then? Are we better than they? Not at all; for we have already charged that both Jews and Greeks are all under sin; ¹⁰ As it is written, 'There is none righteous, not even one; ¹¹ There is none who understands, there is none who seeks for God; ¹² All have turned aside, together they have become useless; there is none who does good, there is not even one."'

C.	The PROVISION for Righteousness	(Romans 3.21-5)
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Romans 3:26 "For the demonstration, I say, of His righteousness at the present time, that He might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus."

D. The **POWER** of Righteousness (Romans 6-8)

Romans 6:6-7 "6 Knowing this, that our old self was crucified with Him, that our body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin; 7 for he who has died is freed from sin."

E. The **PROGRAM** of Righteousness (Romans 9-11)

Romans 11:25 "For I do not want you, brethren, to be uninformed of this mystery, lest you be wise in your own estimation, that a partial hardening has happened to Israel until the fullness of the Gentiles has come in;"

Romans 9:13-18 "13 Just as it is written, 'Jacob I loved, but Esau I hated.' ¹⁴ What shall we say then? There is no injustice with God, is there? May it never be! ¹⁵ For He says to Moses, 'I will have mercy on whom I have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I have compassion.' ¹⁶ So then it does not depend on the man who wills or the man who runs, but on God who has mercy. ¹⁷ For the Scripture says to Pharaoh, 'For this very purpose I raised you up, to demonstrate My power in you, and that My name might be proclaimed throughout the whole earth.' ¹⁸ So then He has mercy on whom He desires, and He hardens whom He desires."

F. The **PRACTICE** of Righteousness (Romans 12-16)

Romans 12:1-2 "1 I urge you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship. 2 And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect."

Romans 14:14-17 "¹⁴ I know and am convinced in the Lord Jesus that nothing is unclean in itself; but to him who thinks anything to be unclean, to him it is unclean. ¹⁵ For if because of food your brother is hurt, you are no longer walking according to love. Do not destroy with your food him for whom Christ died. ¹⁶ Therefore do not let what is for you a good thing be spoken of as evil; ¹⁷ for the kingdom of God is not eating and drinking, but righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit."
